The Alpine Public Library works to build community, encourage literacy, and promote lifelong learning. We endeavor to create and maintain a welcoming facility with relevant and enriching resources that connect our diverse and geographically remote area to the world.

Thank you for the invaluable support you gave APL over the past year. The library, as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, relies on your individual contributions as well as a variety of funding sources including, grants, library sales, fundraising events, and local government support to meet the budget. Your tax-deductible contribution makes a significant impact on the success of the library and our community. We are fortunate that both Brewster County and the City of Alpine have increased annual allotments to the library for 23-24 fiscal year. The library also has a dedicated group of volunteers that give many hours of their valuable time, supporting every aspect of library operations. Thank you so much! Your support makes Alpine Public Library a valuable resource for our community.

APL's adult education program had a very



successful year. The first in-person high school equivalency (HSE) class started in May. Classes continued through the summer and two students completed their HSE tests in APL's Pearson Vue testing center. We had a graduation ceremony in October with about 30 family and friends to help celebrate the occasion. The

graduates still have smiles on their faces. A fall session started in September with ten students. One of the fall students completed the HSE exam and two more will finish soon.

APL's long-awaited expansion started becoming a physical reality in September. After almost six years of planning and



fundraising we are on schedule to finish construction in June of this year. Rough-in plumbing and concrete work are complete. Lumber, roof trusses, and some windows are in site. When the block wall is finished, framing will start followed by electrical and HVAC work. Of course, the schedule assumes favorable weather and adequate availability of materials and supplies. A few comments have been heard about more tax money going into the library for the expansion. Actually, no tax money is being used. APL is making a million-dollar investment in the future of our community. All funding necessary to complete the project was raised through grants and individual donations from library supporters. Our goal is to create a welcoming environment, a community hub that provides education and literacy and connects people with resources they need to thrive.



In September APL launched the Big Bend Regional Resource Directory with support and funding from the Big

Bend Regional Hospital District. The directory is a new source for health and social service information for residents and visitors to the Big Bend region.

BigBendHelp.org is a website that has links, phone numbers and addresses for programs, hotlines, and organizations throughout the tri-county area.

Kids Progamming

Toddler Time continues to be a favorite program at the library. We usually have a full



house of kids and parents each week. The focus of the program is early childhood development with reading, finger-plays, singing, dancing, and sensory activities for kids up to the age of 5.

Throughout the year the library offers Family Science Nights with different STEM themes. Last year activities included astronomy, math, physics, and simple circuits. The programs are designed to be fun for the whole family.

The library received a grant from the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and the Institute of Museum and Library Services for a Texas Reads Program. In cooperation with the Alpine Independent School District, APL is working with kids in 4th and 5th grade classes.

The goal of the program is to help mitigate learning losses caused by the pandemic, generate enthusiasm for reading, and augment students' social-emotional learning using the novel, *The Tiger Rising*, by Kate DiCamillo. This program will focus on the literary technique of symbolism and includes a 3D printing project.

Summer Reading



Summer programs were well attended this year. Better Together, from June to August, included the Kids United program with different topics each week


including a couple of visits from Big Bend Ranch State Park rangers. Beanstack online reading programs were available for kids and adults.


